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## Nonongo Test 03

Li va ĉiumatene sian hundon marŝasemas. He walks his dog every morning. (Tatoeba)

## Nonongo Test 04

Li va ĉiumatene sia hundo vo marŝasemas. He walks his dog every morning. (Tatoeba)

## Nonongo Test 05

Hundo va marŝemas. The dog can walk.

# Nonongo Reverie Again
